PJ's Page

As many of you know, Bruce went to Ethiopia last month as Director of Photography with a project called Hope By Twelve. This NGO is dedicated to helping change the lives of girls in Ethiopia, who are generally sold, married off, traded, mutilated, or marketed by the age of twelve. Folks, this is life changing stuff.

While he was away, I was captured by the pictures that were shared from their time in

Ethiopia. The shining bright faces of the children, the hope that was present there.

As I was having conversation with some pastoral colleagues around this, I actually began the sentence something like this: "Bruce is on this amazing project...it's life changing stuff...really making a difference in the world. I wish I....." And then it hit me. It stopped me in my tracks.

I was wishing that somehow

the work I do, the work we do, as a church, would have the same kind of impact on the world as the work of Hope By Twelve.

And the thing is, we should. We could. We have. We can again.

We find ourselves so caught up in the things that really aren't life affirming, though, that we forget that there is important work to be done in the name of the Gospel. We worry about upkeep of our buildings or whether the coffee is made...and these are not bad in and of themselves. But it they don't move us toward mission and service, if they only care for "us" and not for others, then we are not doing the work that Jesus has called us to. Caring for our building is important in that it allows us a place to gather and hear the Word, it allows us a place where lunches are distributed and folks are invited to breakfast. It provides, for 4 weeks a year, a place for homeless women and children to lay their heads at night.

> Coffee is only important as a means of hospitality and welcome. Shocking, I know! But it is true – if we can take a lesson from Gavin and Kyle Gough, who have started serving others coffee...then we are getting somewhere. They are reaching out with warm smiles and a warm cup o' joe with the Biblical mandate to welcome the stranger and give the thirsty something to drink.

I'll admit it....I am fired up! And I am convicted of all of those "pressing matters" I spend so much time on when I could/should/ would be out sharing Jesus' love in ways that matter. In ways that make a difference. In ways that change the world.

I believe that this is what we mean when we say we are to be "Actively Sharing Christ's Love in Community." Now, there's work to do....let's be about God's work in the world!

As I watched news coverage of yet another disaster, I poured out my grief onto the page, with words as prayer. As we continue to remember the recovery in Oklahoma, I share my thoughts with you, beloved community of faith. ~PJ+

Acts of God May 20, 2013

They are called Acts of God by insurers, those things that are beyond our control. Tornados, hurricanes, earthquakes, floods, tsunamis. These are the things we say we cannot control or prevent, though it is worth considering the impact of our blatant neglect and abuse of the planet.

Insurance companies who come onto the scene in the aftermath of such disasters will label them acts of God. But the truest acts of God happen when the winds have calmed and the earth has stopped shaking and the waters have subsided. The acts of God come in the form of neighbors and friends who bring comfort to one another. The acts of God come from organizations whose primary mission is to provide aid and to assist with rebuilding. The acts of God come from the teenage girl who is distributing bottled water and the family whose doors are open to anyone who needs to come in and rest. The acts of God come in great waves of compassion, in winds of the Spirit.

For those whose response is to suggest that God is somehow meting out punishment, this is not the God whose Son has come into the world. The god you believe in has been crafted from places of fear and mistrust.

The God who acts in the response of disaster and tragedy is a God of abundant love and mercy in the face of hatred and fear. The God who comes with wings of healing will cover all who are in pain. The God who comes, comes again and again, caring for all people through the hands and hearts of God's people. Truly **these** are acts of God.

Vicar's View

As the Northwest Washington Synod met for its assembly last week, I had to occasionally check my facebook page- not because those meetings are ever boring, but because there was something important happening in Columbus, Ohio. Throughout the day, pictures streamed in from graduation day at Trinity Lutheran Seminary: pictures of the graduates in their black caps and gowns in the seminary hallways, smiling professors and proud family members, snapshots of the procession down Main Street, surrounded by the beautiful spring green leaves of buckeye trees, and finally some photos from Mees Hall of the interim President's address, diplomas being handed out, and hymns being sung. The class of 2013 was being sent on their way. They were surrounded by their loving families, by professors and mentors, by dear friends and classmates. As I glanced through the pictures, I could see that they were ready to graduate, ready to interview with congregations and discern where they were being called, ready to be ordained and serve the church as Pastors. The time had come for this moment, and they were prepared to take the next step.

This is the season of graduations, and it seems fitting to me that we send off our students at this time of year, when the green of the trees gives us courage and the summer beckons with adventures-to-come. As proud as we can be when we watch our loved ones graduate, there is also a real element of grief. High school students will walk out into a world that is not governed by the rhythms of school bells that they've known for the past 13 years, college graduates are faced with big guestions about how to make use of their education and offer their gifts in a big, fastpaced world, and we watch them with excitement and anxiety, wondering what will come. But the ritual of graduation signifies that it's time to move on, to take the next step, trusting the graduate is ready for what lies ahead.



Ten months have passed since I first arrived at Luther Memorial, and I will prepare to make my way back to the Midwest in just eight short weeks. It will be hard to say goodbye to this city that I have come to appreciate so much, to the tall trees and the salt water, to the friends and colleagues I have met here, and to you in this congregation, who welcomed me in and provided me with space to grow and learn. Internship is an incredibly formative year in our seminary education, and I can't imagine a place that would have been a better fit for me. It feels like the Spirit was at work, and I'm so grateful for your openness to participate in an internship program. I won't "graduate" from internship, but I will go back to seminary for my last year with your blessing, prepared for what lies ahead. Next May, when it's my class of seminarians walking across the stage, I will be ready in great part due to this wonderful year in your midst.

One final note: I want to be sure to encourage those of you who may be gone during the summer to please say goodbye if you can't be here on July 21 for my farewell celebration! It will be good to say our goodbyes as you simultaneously prepare to welcome Vicar Anja for another formative internship year in September.



Synod and ELCA News

Synod Assembly Update

The Northwest Washington Synod of the ELCA met in assembly in Lynnwood, WA May 16-18. The Presiding

Bishop of the ELCA, Mark Hanson, was our guest speaker, churchwide representative, and convener of our Bishop's election process.

Luther Memorial was represented by Lay Voting Delegates Phyllis and Norman Swenson, by Pastor Julie Hutson as Clergy Voting Delegate, and by Vicar Inge Williams.

Fifteen women and men had been nominated for the office of Bishop, including Pastor Julie Hutson. On the fourth ballot, the assembly elected The Rev. Brian Kirby Unti as our next bishop. Pastor Unti has served at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Renton, WA for thirty three years. (Pastor Julie finished in fourth place.)

In addition to the Bishop's election, the assembly offered celebration and thanksgiving for the ministry of Bishop Wm. Chris Boerger, as he leaves the position of Bishop, due to term limits.

The assembly also passed several Resolutions and Memorials:

- Accompaniment, Awareness-Raising & Advocacy for the People of Holy Land,
- Urging Divestment from Fossil Fuel Corporations
- A Memorial Calling for Conversations about Ministering to Same-Gender Couples and Families
- A Memorial in Support of Legislation Prohibiting Employment Discrimination on the Basis of Sexual Orientation or Gender Identity
- A Memorial in Support of the Uniting American Families Act

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE **RESPONDING TO U.S. TORNADOES**

A two-mile-wide tornado ripped through Moore, Okla., claiming many lives and leaving behind a devastating trail of destruction. Plaza Towers Elementary School stood right in the path of the storm's 166-200 mph winds.

Many homes are damaged or destroyed as tornadoes touched down throughout Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Illinois and Iowa. As strong winds and warm fronts continue to move across the nation, the threat for future tornado outbreaks is looming.

Everlasting God, help us prepare our own hearts and meet us in worship. We pray for all worship leaders, called and lay, musicians, congregation administrators and secretaries. In the name of Jesus we pray. Amen.

Remember in your prayers the evangelism ministry of the Rev. Mawien Ariik, an ELCA missionary in South Sudan.

12 Pray for the work of Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service and its efforts on behalf of the 4.5 million people worldwide forced into sex work and the 16.4 million who are victims of forced labor.
