## PJ's Page



On September 15th we installed Kirby Unti as the Bishop of the NW Washington synod. You might wonder exactly what it is a bishop does. A part of what a bishop does is oversee and guide the work that we do together as a synod – a group of

congregations joined together by virtue of our geography. We do good work in this synod and we offer our prayers for Kirby during this time.

At his installation at St. Mark's Cathedral, the outgoing Presiding Bishop of the ELCA, Mark Hanson, was the preacher. Bishop Hanson likes to have people talk to one another as a part of the sermon. On this particular day, he asked us to consider (and then talk to one another about) whether our congregation was a "settled" congregation or a "sent" congregation. He wanted to know whether we existed largely for ourselves or whether our ministries were geared toward being sent out into the world.

What would you say to this? Is Luther Memorial a settled congregation or a sent congregation?

I've been pondering this question ever since September 15th. Whenever I've engaged in some aspect of ministry since then, I've asked myself, Is this activity a part of being settled or sent? Because when I turned to the person next to me during Bishop Hanson's sermon, to talk about this question, my answer was "Both". That was her answer about her congregation, too. I think it's true that most congregations are both settled and sent. But when we lean too far into being settled, we forget the very reason we are here as a church – to be sent out into the world.

All around us, there are opportunities to be sent. We are sent to serve the women and children of Mary's Place. We are sent to feed the hungry through our gifts to the food bank, our support of the CROP walk, and our brown

bag lunch program. We are sent to be a voice for justice through our support of the Faith Action Network.

## Vicar's View

As I settle into my new role here at Luther Memorial Lutheran Church as vicar, I must admit, I feel a bit disjointed.

For me, fall is a melancholy, nesting time. It is when I find myself wanting to stay home and indoors more. The sun and its warmth recede, and my desire to come out, be public, and commune with nature and people goes with it. My introverted side looms and calls to me, and I long for quiet evenings at home with a book under a blanket, suffocating under my two dogs as they snuggle closer.

This particular fall, though, brings me a disjointedness because the season of my life and my vocation do not match the season of the year. Instead of retreating into the quiet walls of my home, I am eager and excited to enter the noisy, active walls of this church. I desire not only the call of this church, but also the call of this community, both within and without the walls. I find myself delighted to embrace the many ministries of this church, and to discover how I can become embedded. both as a follower and a leader. This feels like the spring of my internship here, not the fall of the year.

This disjointedness continues within me when I hear others call to me, not as "Anja," but as "Vicar Anja." Do I really have this title now? What does it mean to be "Vicar Anja"? I struggle with what this means... has my identity changed? Am I supposed to introduce that we find beauty. It is in the differences myself as "Vicar Anja" instead of just "Anja"? This feels... disjointing.

As I prepare to preach my first LMLC sermon, I Christ. have the blessing (or the curse?) of a choice in Your fellow servant of God, the texts for the day. Sunday, September 29th "Vicar" Anja

is the festival of Michael and All Angels, and the lectionary offers an additional option. I tend to see exciting possibilities in many scenarios; as I try to determine which text I will call, I struggle to choose which text most calls me.

I have chosen the Time after Pentecost reading for my sermon, but this was a difficult decision because the festival of Michael and All Angels Gospel brings up for me my own disjointedness. The original seventy disciples return to Jesus from their first mission and they exclaim, "Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!" Jesus responds that they must not rejoice in the power they have over demons, but rather "rejoice that your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10:17-20). I am reminded of the power that any person in ministry holds, and the responsibility that comes with that power. Does wearing the collared shirt bring me attention and respect that I may or may not deserve? This Gospel informs me that yes, there is power in this role, but that is not to be the source of joy that I feel as I dive into my new life here. The source of my joy is not power, but the humbling privilege that I enjoy as a servant of God.

There is, indeed, disjointedness in all of this, but there is also harmony and beauty. Isn't that the way it always is? It is in the contrast that we are able to come to completion as a person, as a community, and as a body in

## The Unlocked Door by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



#### Friends,

I must share a delightful break through that has taken place at the Synod Office. If you have ever visited you know that when you approach the outside door of the Synod you would find it locked. Once you discovered where the doorbell is located you could ring yourself in and before long someone would open the door for you.

When I first arrived I began to carefully ask the question, Why is the door locked?"

It turned out to be one of those classic church stories" with multiple iterations. The bottom line was a rightful concern for the safety of the people in the building and the fact that before the Synod Office was remodeled there were no direct sight lines to the door.

So I raised with the staff and good people of St. John the competing values we were up against - safety verses hospitality. Both are compelling values and worthy of attention. Raising competing values creates the possibility of a new response that can honor both. We were able to move the issue beyond an either I or posture.

Now we keep the door unlocked during regular office hours. If someone is working alone or if a situation arises where someone feels unsafe we are encouraging the staff to lock the doors.

Hospitality is an important value of the Synod. We hope you will always feel welcomed and well cared for when you enter the door.

And when Jesus knocks we will know he is not asking for us to let him in but rather he is inviting us to come out and join him in the community.
