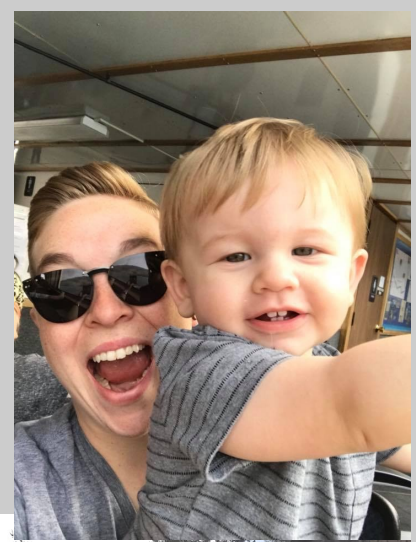

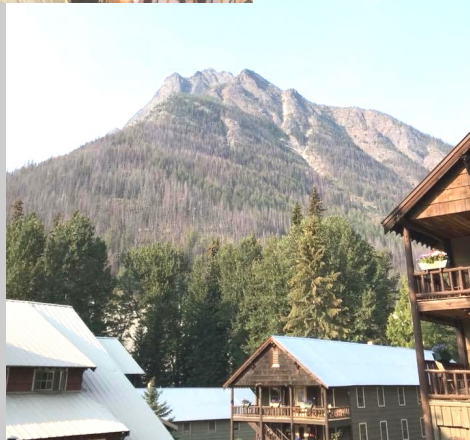

One of my favorite back to school items is a pink eraser. This is followed by #2 pencils (Ticonderoga is my preferred brand) and Crayola crayons. These days, I don't have any children at home to buy school supplies for, but I still like to go to the store and purchase a few for myself. It's a reminder to keep learning.

I've been thinking about the families who will live in Broadview Commons when it opens early next year. I wonder how they are managing the back to school preparation. Do they have a way to get to the store? Can they afford the long list of school supplies? How do they manage all that this season holds while dealing with housing instability?

I'm reminded that as the building looks more and more like apartments (there are now windows!) this time next year may look very different for those families. Preparing for back to school will surely be an easier task when families have secure, stable, permanent housing.

One of the unexpected things that occurs regularly as a result of our partnership with Compass Housing Alliance is that other congregations, Lutheran and not, reach out regularly to ask: How did your congregation do this? I'm always pleased to sit down with them and tell the story, answer their questions, and then take them for a mini-tour of the outside of Broadview Commons and the inside of our building.

Supporting affordable housing is the right thing to do. In our case, though, we do it because of what Jesus taught. That we care for the poor, that we care for those who struggle, that we do unto others as we would have done to us. God stands squarely on the side of the oppressed, the poor, and the marginalized. If we are not on their side, we are against them and against God's call.

I hope you have the chance to tell the story of how Broadview Commons came to be. It's a story of struggle and discernment and loss, to be sure, but it is a story of great faithfulness, courage, and boldness. YOU are the faithful, courageous, bold witnesses to the risen Christ!

Won't you join me in praying for those families who will soon be our neighbors? Will you also join me in holding in prayer students, teachers, staff, and families as they ready for a new school year?

Vicar's Voice

Do not fear. Do not fear is Holden Village's theme for this summer. Since returning from the Village I have been reflecting on this theme as we seem to be living in very fearful times. Along with this theme it was inter-faith week at the Village, so we had the opportunity to learn from and worship alongside Imam Adam Jamal and Rabbi Yohanna Kinberg. Other teaching faculty that were present include Rev. Terry Kylo, John Noltner, Glenn Jordan, Dr. Larry Rasmussen, Laura Norton, Rachel Forde, Jennifer McIntyre, and Dr. Anthony Bateza. Each member of the teaching faculty taught me something about fear and how it has occurred for millennia and is occurring currently.



Rachel Forde and Jennifer McIntyre are public defenders in Snohomish county and taught us about fear in our justice system. I have known that our justice system is rather unjust and corrupt, but I never recognized the role I played in continuing this system. In what ways do I fear those who are incarcerated? In what ways have I allowed the justice system to continue to operate as it has?

Rachel and Jennifer led me to many questions about fear in my life but the session that enlivened my fear the most was the session on sex offenders. Rachel and Jennifer titled this session "Welcoming Modern-day Lepers" and we wrestled as a group with the reality of sex offenders being members in our congregations or even active folks in society. They shared statistics about the rates of sex offenders who had been abused as children (almost all) and shared some video stories of their own clients who were sex offenders. As I listened to Rachel and Jennifer speak about sex offenders and their inability to be accepted back by society, do not fear was running through my mind. Do not fear.

It is an initial reaction to fear sex offenders. We have been taught from a young age that this is one of the most grievous assaults on humankind. Before I attended this session by Rachel and Jennifer I had a major bias against sex offenders. Honestly, that bias still exists but Rachel and Jennifer awoke me to my bias and fear towards sex offenders. Rachel and Jennifer also showed me the humanity in sex offenders and helped me understand the ways in which we can welcome them into our community. This is not a blind welcome but rather a welcome with parameters. A welcome that is informed and cautious but still engages a person in community.

Community is so important whether you are a sex offender or straight A student. Recognizing my own fear during my week at Holden has been eye opening as I continue to recognize all the people and places I fear. We are called to fear not but before we can do that we must recognize where our fear rests. So, I invite you to ponder with me where your fears exist. What population of people do you fear? What places do you fear? What situations do you fear? Let us work together to grant humanity, grace, and peace into these places of fear. *"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine."* Isaiah 43:1

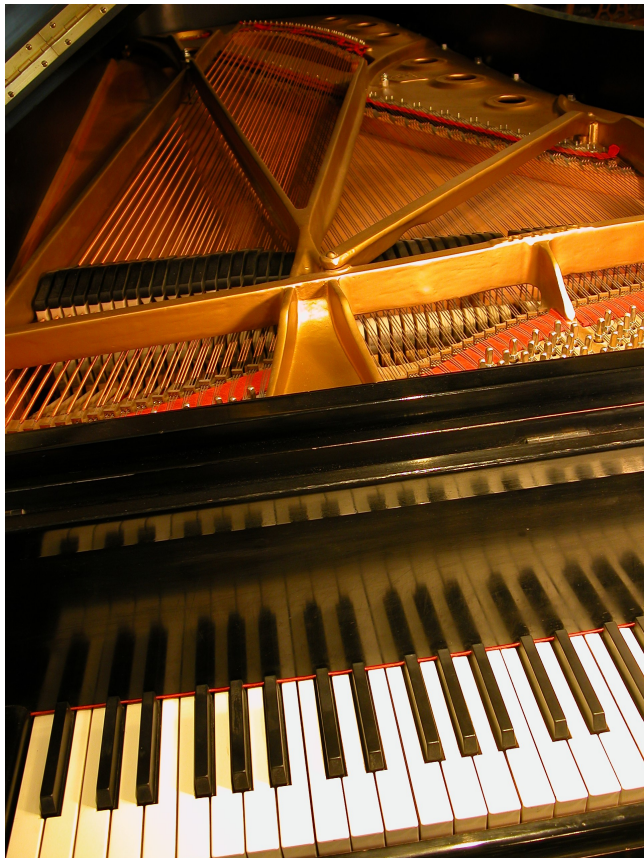

Operation Brown Bag

Lunches are handed out Monday-Friday, 10 am—Noon to anyone who is hungry. Our volunteers try very hard to have a well-rounded sack lunch for this program.

The following items are typical of what goes into the sack lunches:

- **Proteins** - Small can of Vienna sausage, packet of tuna or salmon, a tuna or chicken salad lunch and cracker kit. (Must be able to be opened without a can opener).
- **Fruit** - Fruit cup, applesauce or raisins.
- **Drink** - Juice box or pouch. Additional bottle of water, when available.
- **Dessert** - Pudding cup, gelatin cup or small pack of cookies.
- **Grains** - Small bag of chips, package of crackers, and/or a granola bar.
- **Care Items** - We always hand out individually wrapped hand wipes i.e. Wet-Ones. During the summer/sunny season we hand out small tubes of sunscreen, if we have them available. In winter/cold weather season we hand out handwarmers, gloves, hats and lip balm, if we have them available.



If you'd like to donate supplies, please drop them off on the **table** in Katie's Parish. If you'd like to MAKE lunches, please email/call the office to get starting directions. Lunches can be made at any time that you have time available to volunteer!

God's work. Our hands.

These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the church. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

1 Give thanks that we are a church that values, seeks and works to build connections and partnerships in our communities and globally for doing God's work together using the abundance of assets, skills and diverse perspectives we have as the body of Christ.

2 Traditions in the church can help guide and enrich our faith and worship, and they can sometimes present boundaries and stumbling blocks. Pray our traditions and religious practices are dynamic, meaningful and reflect our theology, Scripture, ministry contexts and prayerful discernment of what God is revealing to us today.

3 Labor Day On this day we pray for and recognize the work people do for the benefit of society and the sustenance of their families. Pray all have fair, safe work, are renewed through times of sabbath, and find joy and fulfillment in their labor; pray for all those who seek employment and for the well-being and care for people who are unable to work.

4 ELCA campus ministry has a presence at more than 180 state and private colleges and universities with cooperating congregations in campus ministry at an additional 400 campuses nationwide. Pray for leaders and congregations serving students, faculty and staff, and for Lutheran Campus Ministry Network's work of strengthening and sustaining ELCA campus ministries.

5 Give thanks for the rich partnership and relationship we have with The Episcopal Church, a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1997. Pray for the church and ask God to further our respect for one another and work together sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor.

6 Pray, as followers of Christ, that we are bold examples and practitioners of civility, respect, truth, justice and empathy for our neighbor in everything we do and say, in every place and circumstance.

7 Remember in prayer young adults beginning a year of service with the Young Adults in Global Mission program; pray the Spirit will equip, sustain and encourage them as they work alongside companion churches and organizations in communities around the world.

8 Pray for seasonal workers who are seeking new employment and places to live, that they are affirmed for their gifts and service and find employment with fair wages, affordable housing and welcoming, supportive communities and congregations.

9 Ask God to sharpen our awareness of when we demonstrate favoritism in our relationships, ministry and daily life, and reassure us of the grace and forgiveness we have in Jesus Christ freeing us to confess our prejudices and strive to change for the sake of doing God's work in the world – without bias.

10 Give thanks to God for the season of fall with its new beginnings, abundant harvests that feed the hungry and rhythms of change in nature that move us to reflect on God with awe and praise.

11 Sing, shout and whisper praises to God, our creator, hope, help and advocate for the poor, hungry, ill, imprisoned, forgotten and oppressed; our inspiration, guide and example.

12 Give thanks for people who work the land and oceans to feed themselves and the world; pray for people living in regions suffering from draught, soil unable to sustain agriculture and changing climate, and ask God to help us find ways to exercise generosity with our resources and food while working together for appropriate and lasting solutions to agricultural problems and hunger.

13 Pray we never lose sight of people – our neighbors and brothers and sisters in Christ – who live in poverty and that we serve as trustworthy advocates and friends who are generous with our resources and care, respectful, value the gifts of all people and are committed to ending poverty and hunger everywhere.

14 Give thanks for the service and leadership of our retired rostered ministers, and pray they continue to respond to God's call to new opportunities – even in retirement – for sharing their gifts, wisdom and experience in their communities, the church and world.

ELCA Prayer Ventures

15 National Hispanic Heritage Month Give thanks to God for the gifts, contributions and rich cultural diversity of our Latino brothers and sisters, and pray for the growth and vitality of the 147 Latino ministries of the ELCA as they share the gospel, equip leaders and serve their neighbors.

16 How do we describe Jesus? We pray that through our baptism and the work of the Spirit we are imprinted with a deep understanding and faith in Jesus as the son of God, the one true messiah – our salvation, hope and light.

17 Remember in prayer the Rev. David and Alecia Brondos, ELCA missionaries working with theological education in Mexico; the Rev. Meghan Brown Saavedra, YAGM country coordinator for Mexico; and the young adults serving alongside our companions in Mexico as part of the Young Adults in Global Mission program.

18 In the midst of the hurricane season and increasingly unpredictable weather, pray for regions of our nation and world susceptible to severe weather and natural disasters; pray for those who are recovering and rebuilding in the wake of disasters, especially where resources and long-term assistance are sparse.

19 Ask God to help guide and temper our words and the manner in which we speak to others so that our speech and tone serve to bless, demonstrate concern and encourage rather than injure, condemn, belittle or divide.

20 Pray for refugees and immigrants everywhere, asking God to grant them safe passage and the diligent support of advocates, caring companions and welcoming congregations and communities.

21 The ELCA and The Episcopal Church are committed to prayer, fasting and advocacy addressing cuts to public programs that are vital to hungry people who are living in poverty. Remember to pray for these concerns, our leaders and people in need on the 21st of each month through December 2018.

22 Pause what you are doing, look around and listen to the concerns and joys of your heart; talk with God about what catches your attention or weighs on you.

23 In this time when power, position and wealth seem to wield more influence and attract more attention than humility, service and generosity, we ask the Holy Spirit to keep us centered in the heart and mind of Jesus, remind us of what God values and direct our attention to people – today and throughout history – who exemplify Jesus' compassion and concern for humanity.

24 Pray the Holy Spirit continues to reveal to us the value and meaning of accompaniment – walking together with Lutheran, ecumenical and interfaith sisters and brothers around the world.

25 Give thanks for God's attentiveness to our prayers – spoken in every language, whispered or silent.

26 Pray for ministry candidates and their families as they await assignment and for those who are involved in the assignment process of helping leaders move forward in their response to God's call to ministry and service – wherever it may lead them.

27 We hold in prayer our leaders gathered for the Conference of Bishops, that they be inspired and sustained by the Holy Spirit for the work of guiding our church in its mission in a complex and changing world that continues to yearn for hope, reconciliation, purpose and good news – the very things we know and experience through Jesus Christ.

28 Pray for faith in God's ways and wisdom, a wisdom that is pure, peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and compassionate acts, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy.

29 Michael and All Angels The mystery of angels – God's messengers – is alive in Scripture and experienced in the world throughout history. Give thanks for all spiritual beings created by God to worship and praise God, fight against evil, protect and help us, and convey to us God's word and will.

30 Give thanks for the diverse and sometimes surprising ways in which members of the body of Christ do God's work in the world and for how the Spirit equips us uniquely for serving our neighbor in unexpected situations and places.

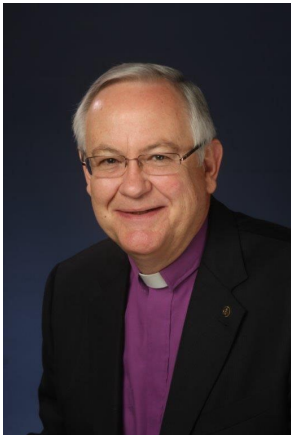

This Changes Everything

Friends,

Our 2019 Synod Assembly will include a Bishop Election in the Northwest Washington Synod. The Synod Council has appointed David Swartling to shepherd the process. You will be hearing more soon about the upcoming timeline which runs from November to May.

I want you to know it has been a real joy and a great honor to have served the Office of Bishop for the last five years. It has afforded me a perspective of the whole church that I otherwise would have never had. It has been a term blessed with the opportunity to spend time with so many wonderful people who make up the church. I have been privileged to meet our ecumenical partners and to break bread with our neighbors of faith. I have been gifted with attending two National Youth Gatherings and to witness the work of our synod's Children, Youth and Family Ministries. I count as one of the greatest blessings the wisdom that has been shared by our Native American sisters and brothers who hold the creation in sacred relationship.

Under my leadership I have placed a strong emphasis upon collaboration between congregations and members of the roster. The emphasis includes strengthening our ministry relationship with partners both within the Lutheran community and beyond. I take seriously Presiding Bishop Eaton's teaching that we are church at our best when we are church together for the sake of the world.

It has also been important to me to see us engage the neighborhood in new ways. All our congregations, in one way or another, serve the local neighborhood through feeding, sheltering, clothing, and providing emergency help. Some of our smallest congregations do so on a scale that is very impressive for their size. I applaud all our congregations for this outreach in Jesus' name.

My emphasis has been on taking the next step in neighborhood engagement - which is not about providing services, but about deep listening to our neighbors for the purpose of joining them in building stronger communities. This next step may seem subtle, but it is a major shift in both how we see our neighbors and relate to them.

I have tried to elevate the place of our specialized ministries as they provide a high level of care where some of the greatest pain exists in the community.

I have also been about the work of our Capital Campaign, Because of You, trying to increase the resources that we have, to form new leaders and to support the work of mission on the territory of our Synod into the future. We set a very ambitious goal of 3 million dollars and the fruit of our efforts need to be realized this next year.

This Synod has been well served through two significant staff changes. The Staff has committed itself to being responsive to the needs of those we serve. Having a good staff has meant I have always looked forward to coming to work and have felt confident when I am away.

This summer I have been in deep discernment as to whether I will allow my name to go forward for a second term. It is a call that is very hard for me to say no to because of the blessing that it has been to serve you.

I have reached the conclusion that I am not going to consider a second term. I feel my shelf life has expired and the Synod is deserving of a leader more gifted to serve the church in these times. There is no doubt in my mind that God will raise up the right leader who is likely to be both culturally and technically more fluent than I.

I will end my term with deep gratitude to the people of this Synod and with a commitment to set the table well for the person who is to follow. It has been a privilege. Grace, grace, grace!!!
